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**Democracy Talks in Manila: The Role of Youth Voices in Democracy** Sep 08 2020 There are various challenges to democracy which have worsened during the Covid-19 pandemic. The webinar was part of the Swedish Government's Drive for Democracy initiative, and among the participants were students, youth leaders and youth advocates of democracy and human rights.

He discusses controversial issues in power analysis, and shows the relevance of older works frequently underappreciated today. Focusing on the social power perspective in international relations, this book sheds light on how power has been considered during the last half century and how it should be approached in future research.

**Causation in International Relations** Feb 11 2021 World political processes, such as wars and globalisation, are engendered by complex sets of causes and conditions. Although the idea of causation is fundamental to the field of International Relations, what the concept of cause means or entails has remained an unresolved and contested matter. In recent decades ferocious debates have surrounded the idea of causal analysis, some scholars even questioning the legitimacy of applying the notion of cause in the study of International Relations. This book suggests that underlying the debates on causation in the field of International Relations is a set of problematic assumptions (deterministic, mechanistic and empiricist) and that we should reclaim causal analysis from the dominant discourse of causation. **Globalising Democracy** Jan 31 2020 Globalizing democracy examines the acceptance of democracy as a global standard of political authority and investigates how the term has evolved to fit such disparate geopolitical contexts. The paradox of modern democracy is that while it originally developed as a means for people to live their lives as they saw fit, democracy itself constitutes an unfamiliar and uncomfortable system of governance for many nonwestern peoples.

This book exposes the ways in which IR has consistently ignored questions of colonialism, imperialism, race, slavery, and dispossession in the non-European world.

**The Global Idea of 'the Commons'** Mar 03 2020 During the last three decades, corporations allied with scientists and universities, national and regional governments, and international financial institutions have, through a variety of mechanisms associated with neo-liberal globalization, acted to dispossess large proportions of the world's population of their commons' resources and enclose them for profit making. In response, throughout the global South and in the cities of the global North, large numbers of people have formed movements to defend the commons in all their variety. The idea of the commons has thus emerged as a global idea, and commons have emerged as sites of conflict around the world. The essays in this forum assess strategically the situations of selected commons in a variety of diagnostic sites where they exist, the ways in which they are being transformed by the incursions of capital and state, and the ways in which they are becoming the locus of struggle for those who depend on them to survive.

**Democracy and the Nation State** Jul 07 2020 This book addresses a contemporary problem that is at the crossroads between two basic political principles. The first one is the idea of representative government based on elections by general suffrage. The second is the sovereignty of the nation-state which says that the world is divided into sovereign states and that only those who are citizens can claim to take part in the political life of a particular nation-state. Mr Hammar, Director of the Centre for Research in International Migration and Ethnic Relations at Stockholm University, argues that increased immigration during the second half of the 20th century has challenged the nation-state and the democratic system as the distinction between formal and substantial citizenship has become blurred. The book, based on a series of articles and reports on this subject written during the last ten years, is divided into four parts. The first part deals with international migration and nationalism. Attention is focused on how immigrants enter a new country and the importance of citizenship as obligatory membership in a state. Included is a short history of citizenship, its emergence during the 19th century, and the relationship between industrialization on the one hand and nationalism and the idea of the nation-state on the other. The second part discusses citizenship, naturalization, and the advantages of dual citizenship. The third part of the book focuses on the increasing activity of foreign citizens in politics and the extent to which they have actually taken part in political elections in countries where they have been allowed to do so. This third part is concluded with an evaluation of those electoral reforms mainly in Scandinavia and the Netherlands which have given voting rights to foreign citizens with three to five years of legal residence. In the final part, the author tries to resolve the lack of congruence between formal citizenship and informal membership resulting from long periods of residence. He discusses two alternative ways to overcome this lack of congruence: through increased naturalization or

through an extension of political rights to those who have had their domicile in the country for a long time.

Its primary concern is with the non-European world and its relations with the North. In advancing an alternative conception of "relations international", the book draws on alternative source material and different forms of writing. It also features short stories, an interview and explores the role of poetics and performance. The suzerainty of the disciplinary writ is challenged on three primary grounds. Firstly on its Eurocentrism, which leads the discipline to pass lightly over the distinctive life experiences of most of the world's people. Secondly, on the discipline's failure to engage in any systematic way with other bodies of knowledge about the international, as for example international political economy, postcolonialism and development. Lastly, it confronts the 'top down' nature of the politics of the discipline, and that seldom addresses everyday life. From squatter towns to the evasions of the poor, from law through to literature, this work raises a number of problems for International relations. It challenges a colonial mindset, de-centres the west and opens the field to new approaches that are far more inter-disciplinary than international relations generally allows. It is a provocative contribution for students and scholars of IR and Postcolonial studies alike.

**Why Electoral Integrity Matters** Oct 22 2021 The book is the first in a planned trilogy by Pippa Norris on Challenges of Electoral Integrity to be published by Cambridge University Press. Unfortunately too often elections around the globe are deeply flawed or even fail. Why does this matter? It is widely suspected that such contests will undermine confidence in elected authorities, damage voting turnout, trigger protests, exacerbate conflict, and occasionally lead to regime change. Well-run elections, by themselves, are insufficient for successful transitions to democracy. But flawed, or even failed, contests are thought to wreck fragile progress. Is there good evidence for these claims? Under what circumstances do failed elections undermine legitimacy? With a global perspective, using new sources of data for mass and elite evidence, this book provides fresh insights into these major issues.

**History of International Relations Theory** Jun 29 2022 Torbjorn L. Knutsen introduces ideas on international relations expressed by thinkers from the High Middle Ages to the present day and traces the development of four ever-present themes: war, peace, wealth and power. The book counters the view that international relations has no theoretical tradition and shows that scholars, soldiers and statesmen have been speculating about the subject for the last 700 years. Beginning with the roots of the state and the concept of sovereignty in the Middle Ages, the author draws upon the insights of outstanding political thinkers - from Machiavelli and Hobbes to Hegel, Rousseau, and Marx and contemporary thinkers such as Woodrow Wilson, Lenin, Morgenthau and Walt - who profoundly influenced the emergence of a discrete discipline of International Relations in the twentieth century. Fully revised and updated, the final section embraces more recent approaches to the study of international relations, most notably postmodernism and ecologism.

**Political Parties in Africa** Jan 13 2021 Provides a broad, comparative analysis of 27 African countries and 75 political parties. The data was assembled during 2004-06 and was followed by national and sub-regional dialogue workshops between political parties, researchers and civil society. The agenda for reform that emanated from the research and dialogue process is reflected and discussed in the report. Legislative regulation of parties, women's participation, funding of political parties, party democracy and party programmes and policies that represent and reflect the preferences of the people are high on the agenda for the process ahead. By providing comparative information, this International IDEA publication aims to stimulate debate on the challenges faced by political parties in Africa. It is especially aimed at political parties, scholars, policy makers and democracy assistance organizations working for political reform in Africa.

**Postnational Democracy** Dec 12 2020 Postnational Democracy examines the concept of political community beyond the Nation State and discusses its possible structure in the context of the European Union. It explores the evolution of political identity within the context of the Nation State and considers the manner in which international organisations in general have affected the 'shared understandings' which have evolved over the course of time. It concludes that it is only in the context of the European Union that the public realm of politics within the constituent Nation States has been consistently undermined. The book suggests that the notion of democracy beyond the Nation State is a feasible concept and thereby seeks to link in with more deliberative ideas of democracy than the representative model favoured by the Nation State. Two particular factors are developed in this context: the growth 'from below' of a nascent European 'civil society' and the potential offered by advanced information technology in terms of facilitating the future emergence of postnational political identity, complementary to national political identity.

**The Implementation of Quotas** Jun 05 2020 Findings from the 2002 workshop held by International IDEA in Jakarta, Indonesia, to discuss the implementation of quotas in Asia are examined in this report. Aiming to increase awareness of women's political representation as well as their involvement in decision-making bodies, these findings explore the use of gender quotas in Bangladesh, East Timor, India, Indonesia, and Pakistan. When, where, and how gender quotas have been successfully implemented is examined, as well as the challenges, controversies, and consequences of enforcement. Strategies employed for gender equality in government in other non-Asian countries with different political systems are also discussed.
